# LOOKING BACK AT A YEAR OF New Beginnings

#### LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

Dear Habitat Community,

In June 2013 the "new" executive Director Elizabeth Bridgewater welcomed me into the Habitat community as the office manager for Pioneer Valley Habitat for Humanity. I was immediately



impressed with the kindness and generosity of Habitat's volunteers. Within weeks, people I had never met were helping me with tasks big and small - Jim Harvey installed new computer software, George Hollywood put in our air conditioner for the summer, Paul McDonough taught me how to use QuickBooks...and if I kept listing the volunteers I'd have no room to write anything else in this report!

The summer of 2013 Bill Gemmel, a long-time volunteer, joined the staff and spearheaded the effort for us to finish construction at 3 Garfield Avenue in Northampton after a hiatus due to a health issue for the lead instructor at the Smith Vocational and Agricultural High School. With the school at that point unable to provide the steady flow of work it previously had, community volunteers stepped in and got this project on track and a new Voc School teacher, Chadd Meerbergen, got the students back on site for the 2013-2014 school year. By spring 2014 after a job well done, Bill decided to leave the staff to return to construction work, but you will still see him volunteering at the construction site.

Spring of 2014 also saw the beginning of construction at 5 Garfield Avenue, where key volunteers Walt Kohler and Charlie Klem agreed to cross the river from Amherst to lead construction for the last house in this 5-home subdivision. They have been working nearly every Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday so that we can meet an end of 2014 grant deadline to finish this house. Please join them to help complete the job!

Back in the office, Keegan Pyle and Jean Savarese were actively finding the resources to help our partner families and build new houses. The 2013 Gingerbread Build organized by Jean and a team of volunteers was a huge success with a record number of teams coming out to raise money and have fun building gingerbread houses. From architects to school groups they got into the spirit of things with the help of our lead event sponsor Nicky D's. The Habitat community stepped up throughout the year to give generously during Valley Gives, respond to our annual appeal, make in-kind gifts and much more

This past year was also a year of planning for our first Women Build, dubbed the MJ Adams Legacy Project, on East Street in Easthampton. Easthampton Savings Bank stepped up early to be a partner in our Federal Home Loan Bank of Boston grant application, to give a \$10,000 home sponsorship donation and to offer several

On June 3rd, Easthampton mayor Karen Cadieux, members of the city's planning department, the Habitat volunteer design team and others from the community officially kicked off this exciting project during a festive celebration at the bank's Operations Center.

The second half of fiscal year 2014 became a time of transition as Keegan, Jean, Elizabeth and Bill moved on from their positions at Pioneer Valley Habitat for Humanity. We miss them all and wish them all the best in their new endeavors! And while we miss the hard work of these great staff, the change allowed us the opportunity to welcome new faces. During the search for a new executive director I was promoted to Operations Director and Amy Landry was hired as an interim Director of Development. Peter Jessop of Integrity Design & Construction, a long-time Habitat volunteer and past board member, graciously agreed to fill the role of interim Executive Director. Peter, Amy and I had a lot of fun swinging into our new roles and keeping the good ship habitat on course.



In late June 2014, I was honored to accept an offer from the board to be Pioneer Valley Habitat for Humanity's next Executive Director. While I started at Habitat to work on the small everyday things, I am happy to put to use my knowledge and passion for green affordable housing in a new way.

Before working for Habitat I worked as a manager of the Green Building Services team at the Center for EcoTechnology and as a consultant to the volunteer-run Valley Community Land Trust. My broad experience and master's degree in Regional Planning are complimented by the skills and expertise of our new director of resource development Amy Landry who agreed to stay on with Pioneer Valley Habitat as part of our new team. From her management of a number of Valley arts and educational institutions to serving as U.S. director of education for Dr. Hauschka Skin Care to facilitating the partnership work of the human rights portfolio at Proteus Fund, Amy contributes experience in creative program and partnership development, organizational thinking and engagement. She also brings a love of teaching and lifelong learning, a commitment to building community networks, warmth and humor to our workplace.

I deeply appreciate the work of Pioneer Valley Habitat's past Executive Directors Elizabeth Bridgewater and MJ Adams to build a dynamic and caring organization for our community. Please join us as we embark on the journey of building homes, hope and community for the next 25 years and beyond.





#### **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

#### BUILDING COMMITTEE

Planning and construction was under way at four sites during the past fiscal year:

- 3 Garfield Avenue, Florence In partnership with Smith Vocational and Agricultural High School, construction of the fourth of five houses on land donated by the town of Northampton began in October 2012. Construction was completed in July 2014.
- 5 Garfield Avenue, Florence Construction on the 5th and final Habitat house on Garfield Avenue began in October 2013 but winter came before the slab could be poured. Construction resumed in April 2014 and is expected to be completed in December 2014.
- East Street, Easthampton In February 2014 Smith Vocational and Agricultural High School Forestry students and staff began clearing trees from the site in preparation for two homes on land donated by the Town of Easthampton. This a Women Build site where men are welcome but at least 70% of the volunteers are expected to be women. Groundbreaking happened in July 2014.
- East Pleasant Street, Amherst In April 2014 the Town of Amherst selected PVH as the developer of two units of affordable housing on the site of the former Hawthorne Farm at 235 East Pleasant Street. Construction is targeted to begin in June of 2015.



In addition to overseeing the design and construction of homes, the Building Committee revised PVH's building design specifications and developed a home warranty policy for new homes, a basic house design and options policy and job descriptions for site supervisors and crew leaders.

#### FAMILY SELECTION COMMITTEE

This has been a very busy and eventful year for the Family Selection Committee. The selection for the home at 5 Garfield Ave in Florence was finalized at the beginning of the year. Our new partner family for the build is the Wolcotts from Florence, MA. Chris, Katie and their two sons lan and Lucas are now hard at work fulfilling their dreams and working on their new home.



The final selection of the 5 Garfield Ave build led right into the next Family Selection Cycle for the East St, Easthampton properties. This build is a zero lot line 2 unit home. Unit 1 is a one story, fully accessible 3 bedroom unit and Unit 2 is a four bedroom, 2 story unit. The selection for these 2 families will be conducted by a lottery and preference system for each unit that would include all income qualified applicants. We began the cycle with 3 public Information sessions. One session was held at The Easthampton Community Center, one at the Easthampton Municipal Building and the final one at the Habitat Office in Florence. There was a total 13 applications received for both units. Our goal is to have the lottery and final approval for our families completed by September 16th.

#### **COMMITTEE REPORTS (CONT.)**

#### FAMILY SUPPORT COMMITTEE

Over the course of the year, the committee provided mentoring support and facilitated the Habitat requirement for sweat equity activity for two partner families. Family Support also completed, in collaboration with the Building Committee, the "Basic House Design and Options" documents that will assist mentors and be included in the Mentor Handbook. On Mother's Day, a wall raising was held at 5 Garfield Avenue, Florence, attended by community officials, vocational school students who had contributed labor, and local Pioneer Valley Habitat volunteers. The committee had conversations around the challenges of small condo associations and the board subsequently passed a condominium policy.

Future tasks for the committee include:

- recruit new committee member from Easthampton area;
- revise the Mentor Handbook (dedications, closings, etc.); and
- plan, implement and evaluate Family Support activities.

#### STRATEGIC PLANNING COMMITTEE

In Elizabeth Bridgewater's new role as Executive Director she worked with the board to form a strategic planning committee. The committee began with a SWOT analysis (Strengths Weaknesses Opportunities and Threats) and both short and long-term cash flow analyses. This committee went on a brief hiatus during the executive director search as many of the members also served on the search committee. The strategic planning committee has since regrouped and is actively engaged in exploring options to improve the long term fiscal health of PVHH, while also focusing on the continued, successful realization of its mission.
